jewish christianity is a contested category in current research but for precisely this reason it may offer a powerful lens through which to rethink the history of jewish christian relations traditionally jewish christianity has been studied as part of the origins and early diversity of

christianity collecting revised versions of previously published articles together with new materials annette yoshiko reed reconsiders jewish christianity in the context of late antiquity and in conversation with jewish studies she brings further attention to understudied texts and traditions from late antiquity that do not fit neatly into present day notions of christianity as distinct from judaism in the process she uses these materials to probe the power and limits of our modern assumptions about religion and identity

over the past few decades there has been a dramatic and unprecedented shift in jewish christian relations including signs of a new improved christian attitude towards jews christianity in jewish terms is a jewish theological response to the profound changes that have taken place in christian thought the book is divided into ten chapters each of which features a main essay written by a jewish scholar that explores the meaning of a set of christian beliefs following the essay are responses from a second jewish scholar and a christian scholar designed to generate new conversations within the american jewish community and between the jewish and christian communities christianity in jewish terms lays the foundation for better understanding it was named a choice outstanding academic book of 2001

this book charts the shifting boundaries of judaism from antiquity to the modern period in order to bring clarity to what scholars mean when they claim that ancient texts or groups are within judaism as well as exploring how rabbinic jews christians and muslims have negotiated and renegotiated what judaism is and is not in order to form their own identities belief in jesus as the messiah was seen as part of first century judaism but by the fourth or fifth century the boundaries had shifted and adherence to jesus came to be seen as outside of judaism resituating new testament texts within first or second century judaism is an historical exercise that may broaden our view of what judaism looked like in the early centuries ce but normatively these texts remain within christianity because of their reception history the historical within judaism perspective however has the potential to challenge and reshape the theology of contemporary christianity while at the same time the long held consensus that belief in jesus cannot belong within judaism is again challenged by the modern messianic jewish movement

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in all three abrahamic faiths judaism christianity and islam marriage is part of god s plan for humanity as illustrated in the hebrew scriptures the new testament and the koran as well as the religious literature of these three traditions it is viewed as a sacred bond as well as a means to personal fulfilment it is more than a legal contract rather an institution with cosmic significance legitimized through divine authority in judaism christianity and islam the purpose of marriage is to build a home create a family and thereby perpetuate society yet despite the similarity of perception in the great monotheistic faiths there are important differences in this book three scholars outline sex law betrothal and marriage family life and the understanding of divorce in these traditions and discuss the differences between them in a student friendly and accessible way

many people focus on the similarities between judaism and christianity but the religions are quite different and it s not just because one accepts jesus as the messiah and the other does not the rise of christians calling themselves messianic jews the successes of christian missionaries jews ingratiating themselves to evangelical christians because of their support for the state of israel the overuse of the term judeo christian and the increasing use of jewish rituals in christian churches blur the lines between judaism and christianity develop a better understanding of the irreconcilable differences between judaism and christianity and where the two faiths hold mutually exclusive beliefs you ll learn how their views differ regarding god humanity the devil faith versus the law the messiah and more both faiths read the same biblical verses but understand them so differently and missionary christians use this blurring of the lines between the two faiths and other techniques to convert jews to christianity real interfaith dialogue begins when those engaging in it not only speak of how they are similar but also where they differ real understanding begins when the topics discussed are in areas of disagreement judaism and christianity a contrast will help you understand the jewish view of these disagreements

this insightful volume represents the hands on experience in the world of academia of two jewish scholars one of orthodox background and the other a convert to the jewish faith as a series of separate but interrelated essays it approaches multiple issues touching both the historical jesus himself a pious jew and the modern phenomenon of messianic judaism it bridges the gap between the typically isolated disciplines of jewish and christian scholarship and forges a fresh level of understanding across religious boundaries it delves into such issues as the nature and essence of jesus message pietistic militant or something of a hybrid and whether messianic jews should be welcome in the larger jewish community its ultimate challenge is to view sound scholarship as a means of bringing together disparate faith

traditions around a common academic table serious research of the great nazarene becomes interfaith discourse

the art of interpreting holy scriptures flourished throughout the culturally heterogeneous pre modern orient among jews christians and muslims different ways of interpretation developed within each religion not without considering the others how were the interactions and how productive were they for the further development of these traditions have there been blurred spaces of scholarly activity that transcended sectarian borders what was the role played by mutual influences in profiling the own tradition against the others these and other related questions are critically treated in the present volume

in september 2002 twenty one prominent catholic and protestant scholars released the groundbreaking document a sacred obligation which includes ten statements about jewish christian dialogue focused around a guiding claim revising christian teaching about judaism and the jewish people is a central and indispensable obligation of theology in our time following the worldwide reception of their document the authors have expanded their themes into seeing judaism anew the essays in this volume offer a conceptual framework by which christians can rethink their understanding of the church s relationship to judaism and show how essential it is that christians represent judaism accurately not only as a matter of justice for the jewish people but also for the integrity of christian faith by linking new testament scholarship to the shoah christian liturgical life and developments in the church this volume addresses the important questions at the heart of christian identity such as are only christians saved why did jesus die why is israel so important to jews and what should we think about the conflict in the middle east how is christianity complicit in the holocaust what is important about jesus being a jew

few studies focus on the modes of knowledge transmission or concealment or the trends of continuity or change from the ancient to the late antique worlds in antiquity knowledge was cherished as a scarce good cultivated through the close teacher student relationship and often preserved in the closed circle of the initiated from assyrian and babylonian cuneiform texts to a shi ite islamic tradition this volume explores how and why knowledge was shared or concealed by diverse communities in a range of ancient and late antique cultural contexts from caves by the dead sea to alexandria both normative and heterodox approaches to knowledge in jewish christian and muslim communities are explored biblical and qur anic passages as well as gnostic rabbinic and esoteric islamic approaches are discussed in this volume a range of scholars from assyrian studies to jewish christian and islamic studies examine diverse approaches to and modes of knowledge transmission and concealment shedding new light on both the interconnectedness as well as the unique aspects of the monotheistic faiths and their relationship to the ancient civilisations of the fertile crescent

for jews christians and muslims as for all human beings military conflicts and war remain part

of the reality of the world the authoritative writings of judaism christianity and islam namely the hebrew bible the new testament and the koran as well as the theological and philosophical traditions based on them bear witness to this fact showing the influence of different historical political situations various views sometimes quite similar sometimes more divergent have developed in the three religions to justify the waging of war under certain circumstances such views have also been integrated in different ways into legal systems while in certain cases theologies have provide legitimation for military expansion and atrocities the aim of the volume the concept of just war in judaism christianity and islam is to explore the respective understanding of just war in each one of these three religions and to make their commonalities and differences discursively visible in addition it highlights and explains the significance of the topic to the present time can the concepts developed in the jewish christian and islamic traditions in order to justify war serve as a foundation for contemporary peace ethics or do religious arguments always add fuel to the fire in armed conflict the contributions in this volume will help provide answers to these and other socially and politically relevant questions
